WEDNESDAY MORNING LECTIO DIVINA

I, then, a prisoner for the Lord, urge you to live in a manner worthy of the call you have received, with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another through love, striving to preserve the unity of the spirit through the bond of peace: one body and one Spirit, as you were also called to the one hope of your call; one Lord, one faith, one baptism; one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all. But grace was given to each of us according to the measure of Christ's gift.

And he gave some as apostles, others as prophets, others as evangelists, others as pastors and teachers, to equip the holy ones for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ, until we all attain to the unity of faith and knowledge of the Son of God, to mature manhood,* to the extent of the full stature of Christ, so that we may no longer be infants, tossed by waves and swept along by every wind of teaching arising from human trickery, from their cunning in the interests of deceitful scheming. Rather, living the truth in love, we should grow in every way into him who is the head, Christ, from whom the whole body, joined and held together by every supporting ligament, with the proper functioning of each part, brings about the body's growth and builds itself up in love.



A FUTURE FOR SYNODALITY IN PASTORAL PLANNING: HELPFUL DISPOSITIONS

From the *Vademecum*, section 2.3

Synods are a time to dream and "spend time with the future." We are encouraged to create a local process that inspires people, with no one excluded to create a vision of the future filled with the joy of the Gospel.

The *Vademecum* enumerates 12 attitudes that "enable genuine listening and dialogue."
